Goals	<p>Conceptual Frame for ARCH 401: The main problematic of the project is defined as “articulating into the city.” In this context, the students are expected to approach the existing urban fabric in the complex and multi-layered structure of the city, in parallel with the current dynamics and in the context of a given architectural design problem. At the same time, architectural design is expected to consider urban design decisions and urban transformation processes.</p> <p>The framework: Neighborhood ‘mahalle’ / Living area with mixed functions.</p> <p>Conceptual Frame for ARCH 302: The main problematic of the project is defined as “articulating into the city.” In this context, the students are expected to approach the existing urban fabric in the complex and multi-layered structure of the city, in parallel with the current dynamics and in the context of a given architectural design problem.</p> <p>The framework: Neighborhood ‘mahalle’ / Living area in which residential use is the dominating function.</p> <p>Therefore the problematics of the design for the both courses are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Investigating a specific urban environment, analyzing the site, representing site explorations and contextualizing a place. Working with different scales from landscape to interiors. Merging urban and architectural scales. Designing in reference to the urban context. Getting acquainted with building masses, modularization, diversification, efficiency of circulation in a mass and habitation units. Interpreting the program composed of housing units and shared and social functions throughout various discussions on the concepts such as living together, co-housing, co-living, “lojman,” “mahalle,” dwelling, and habitation. Hybridization of the mass housing program including social and shared spaces. <p>The topic of the design:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Urban housing project in an urban setting with approximately 18.000 m² closed area.
Learning Outcomes	<p>ARCH (302+401):</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> To define the problems or potentials of an urban pattern with its varying dimensions like history, culture, topography. Learning to merge urban and architectural scales and understanding the notions of urban gaps and thresholds. Learning to produce/define an original scenario. Learning to work on both urban (1/2000) and architectural (1/500, 1/200) scales. To present the concept and design processes. Hybridization of a mass housing program including social and shared spaces.
Course Content	<p>ARCH (302+401):</p> <p>Main task of the course is to develop an urban housing design that would be integrated into the urban life in consideration with socio-spatial dimensions of the given fields. It is expected to understand an urban pattern with its all layers in the context of space, culture, history, sociability, or topography. The studio consolidates how architecture is involved in society and “place.” It explores numerous issues and potentials in terms of space and culture.</p> <p>More specifically, the studio will discuss living together, bringing people together, distinctive cultures of “mahalle,” encountering in the city, dwelling and a shared habitus. There will be more than one project site to enhance the discussion environment of the studio about local urban dynamics.</p>

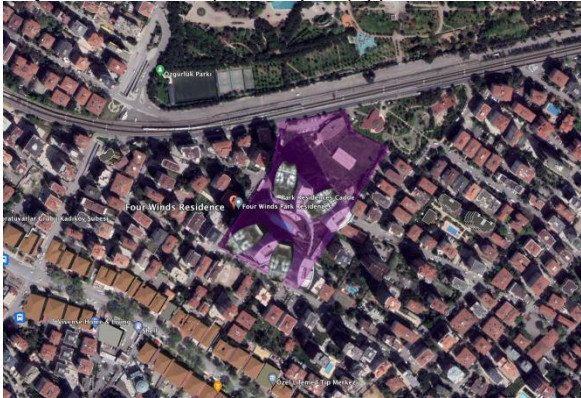
Project Area 1: Süleymaniye, the area under transformation neighboring İMÇ (The possible field will be discussed with the students.)

Project Area 5 will be a field which will be related with Dragos Campus and will be chosen by the students after discussions in the studio.

Program:

Housing units: 18.000 m2 (including circulation)

There should be **at least 4** different types of habitation units.

	Social and shared spaces: The students should define social and shared spaces according to the analyzed urban context. The project scenario defines user profiles, types of units, relations between common spaces and the housing units, interrelation with the city, publicity and public-private shifts, definition and contextualisation of common functions. Social and shared spaces could be defined as open, closed and semi-closed spaces.
